A Spay and Neuter Mission

SCAR has been offering low-cost spay & neuter clinics for pet owners who cannot afford a Veterinarian since shortly after we opened in 2010. The clinics, with Dr. Sara White of Spay ASAP, were once a month until we had to cancel them due to the COVID-19 pandemic. When we started them up again we had the idea to double our efforts and hold two clinics a month to try to "catch back up."



It's a few years later and we are still holding two clinics a month! These clinics are a ton of work for both our staff and volunteers, but we are thrilled to be able to keep offering these much needed services to the community. Stopping pet overpopulation in our community is an important part of our mission. So far in 2024, we have spayed or neutered 65 dogs, 9 rabbits, and 537 cats!

We would like to remind everyone to contact us as soon as a new pet joins your family. We often have a waiting list of several months, especially for dogs and female cats. People call for appointments because their male kittens are beginning to spray, their female kittens have begun going into heat, or they have a brother/sister pair of puppies or kittens who are now maturing (and they are afraid of accidental litters). By contacting us as soon as you can, you increase the likelihood that we can get them spayed or neutered before they begin having behavioral issues or you end up with an unwanted litter. As for the myth that you have to wait until all pets are six+ months old-they can be safely spayed or neutered as young as eight weeks of age. Spaying your female dogs and cats also reduces the chances of mammary cancer, and eliminates the risk of pyometra!

Aren't Cats Wonderful?

Is It Comfort or Love?

Cats show love in many ways and as most cat lovers know, no two cats behave in the same way. Their body language, behavior, and vocalization often tell us a lot about their level of trust and affection. Acknowledging and understanding these overt and often subtle behaviors can help you build a strong, loving bond with your cat. A cat's love is not always easy to gain, but once that trust is established, it is a wonderful relationship.



Eye Contact. This is a significant factor in how cats show love. Cats only make eye contact with people they like. They are even known to make "eye kisses!" This is when a cat stares at you with half closed eyelids and then slowly blinks, repeatedly. It's a gesture that can be reciprocated. So if you notice your cat giving you a "kiss", why not give them one in return?

Body Language. More specifically, tail language, is very important when considering how cats show love. You can tell a lot from the way in which a cat

is holding their tail. A very happy cat tail position is upright, with a slight curve at the top, which means that they are glad to see you! Similarly, if a cat feels comfortable enough to offer up their belly for a rub, this is the ultimate sign of feline trust and affection. Cats only lie on their backs and show their bellies when they are in their most relaxed state.

Bunting. Your cat may bump their head against you or rub their cheeks against you to show affection. This is a social behavior that is formed in kitten-hood through contact with their mother and other kittens. It helps cats bond together and is offered to their humans to show love. It is an attempt to mark you with their scent to claim you as one of their own. It is a very strong form of affection.



Vocalization. While cats can't speak, they can use what vocalization is available to them to help communicate their affection. Purring is often a sign of pleasure and

contentment which is expressed during close contact such as stroking, grooming, or just sitting in your lap. They are letting you know through their vocalization capability, how much they are enjoying this bonding time. While there might be an element of "please don't stop!" in that purring, they're also saying "I love you."

Sleeping Near You. A cat who chooses to sleep on or close to you is showing their love and trust in you. Even if they choose to lie just out of reach for petting, this means that they feel safe and trust that you will protect them, or they will protect you if danger appears.

Kneading. This is a behavior that begins in kitten-hood and is associated with nursing. Relaxed cats that knead are showing contentment. They will often knead when you pet them. Sometimes cats knead to create a softer sleeping spot, which is considered an innate behavior.

Greeting or Following You. Cats that rush to the front door when it's opened, with a lot of meowing are trying to say that they're happy to see you. Cats will often follow those that they love and trust around the home, keeping you in sight. They may also weave around your legs.

Bringing You Presents. Cats are natural born hunters. One that is allowed outdoors will kill small animals and birds, bringing the remains back to their humans as a gift. It is a sign of affection as your cat wants to reward you for your love. Indoor cats will often do this with toys or other small objects since they do not have the opportunity to go on safari.

Why Cats Like High Places

From cat trees to refrigerator and cabinet tops, it's obvious that cats enjoy being above the rest of us. They seem to have no fear of heights and their natural agility enables them to rise (and descend) to the occasion. Why do they engage in this type of behavior?

To Better Regulate Body Heat. Maybe from their Thermodynamics textbook cats have learned that heat rises. High places will be warmer and more desirable during cooler months. A location in a sunny spot is especially attractive for those cat naps or relaxation in any form.

To Manage Stress and Anxiety. A high place to curl up can give a cat a sense of privacy and calm in a busy household. It may also be the cat's place of refuge from external

factors such as storms or fireworks. More timid or territorial cats will thus have a place that just belongs to them and contains their own scent.

To Enjoy Themselves. Cats are curious animals. Vertical in addition to horizontal space enlarges their territory significantly. It gives them more to investigate and explore. They have a better view of the environment as they watch what is going on in their kingdom.



To Get Better Rest. Behavioral experts think that most cats prefer to sleep and rest in places with good vantage points. Besides the top of cabinets or refrigerators, the best

points. Besides the top of cabinets or refrigerators, the best high place is often a commercially available cat tower. These towers of different heights have many components such as padded or covered perches, cubby holes, attached toys, and scratching posts. These provide opportunities for comfortable rest, elevated observation, furniture-free scratching, play and exercise. ~Carl Schafer
